Local area Special Educational Needs and Disabilities report for Wirral Council

This report presents the statistics on SEND available for Wirral, compared to your selected comparison group of All English metropolitan boroughs. This should help to assess how well arrangements since the reforms are working and compare delivery across local areas.

The aim is to bring local area SEND data into one place, providing an evidence base that can be a starting point for conversations at a local and national level on progress and priorities.

However, this is not a checklist against which local areas should measure performance. These statistics tell only part of the story, and what makes a successful outcome will vary hugely for individual children and young people.

Much of the information below is education-focused - this is because most of the data available currently relates to education. The Department for Education is working with the Department of Health & Social Care to link data from their Children and Young People's Health Services Data Set to the national pupil database, as this will increase health data for SEND pupils significantly. We hope to add this data to this report once available.



Local area SEND information

In Wirral 21.9% of pupils have a statutory plan of SEN (statement or EHC plan) or are receiving SEN support (previously school action and school action plus). This compares to an average of 19.4% across All English metropolitan boroughs. NB these figures, and those in the first three charts below, are for pupils attending state schools in Wirral. They do not include children and young people for whom Wirral is responsible but has placed out of borough.





Across All English metropolitan boroughs, the proportion of pupils with statements or education, health and care (EHC) plans ranges from 2.8% to 6.4%. Wirral has a value of 6.2%, compared to an average of 4.9% in All English metropolitan boroughs.

% of pupils with a statement or EHC Plan (from 2019/20 (academic) to 2023/24 (academic))



For SEN support the proportion for All English metropolitan boroughs ranges from 10.7% to 17.7%. Wirral has a value of 15.8%, compared to an average of 14.5% in All English metropolitan boroughs.



Looked after children and children in need

Looked after children are defined as those looked after by the local authority for one day or more. In Wirral, 28.4% of looked after children are on SEN support, compared to 28.2% in All English metropolitan boroughs. 26.4% of looked after children in Wirral have a statement of SEN or EHC Plan, compared to 28.9% in All English metropolitan boroughs.



Children in need

Children in need are defined in law as children who need local authority services to achieve or maintain a reasonable standard of health or development, need local authority services to prevent significant or further harm to health or development, or are disabled.

In All English metropolitan boroughs, 23.2% of Children in Need are on SEN support and 22.5% have a statement of SEN or EHC plan. In Wirral, 26.1% of children in need are on SEN support and 25.2% of children in need have a statement of SEN or EHC plan.


% of children in need with SEN support and % of children in need with statements or EHC plans (2022/23 (academic))




Primary Need

A child or young person has SEN if they have a learning difficulty or disability which calls for special educational provision to be made for them. All pupils with SEN have an assessment of their primary need. The following charts show the breakdown of need in Wirral by primary, secondary and special school, compared to the national averages and ranked by prevalence.






Primary need in secondary schools (2023/24 (academic))




Primary need in special schools (2023/24 (academic))



The child's parent or the young person has the right to request a particular school, college or other institution to be named in their statement or EHC plan. The chart below "Placement of children and young people for whom the LA maintain a statement or EHC plan" shows the type of schools pupils with statements or EHC plans have been placed in by Wirral, compared to national averages and ranked by frequency.


Placement of children and young people with a LA statement or EHC plan (2023/24 (academic))



Reported expenditure

The metrics below show the reported expenditure on SEN in Wirral. This figure is based on the total reported weekly expenditure on SEN by the local authority, divided by the number of pupils with statements or EHC plans. In Wirral, this figure is £80 per week per child, in the previous period it was £85; this compares to the average for All English metropolitan boroughs of £99.

Weekly expenditure per child with statement/plan (from 2018/19 to 2022/23)



Councils also provide respite for disabled children aged 0-17. In Wirral, spend in the most recent period was £36.90 per child, compared to £{=value? metricType=6121&period=latest-1&area={parent-area-identifier}} in the previous period; in All English metropolitan boroughs, the average is £41.23 per child, an increase since the previous period (£35.12). This figure is calculated by taking the local area's expenditure on direct payments, short breaks and other support for disabled children and dividing this by the number of 0-17 year olds in the LA.




Implementation of the reforms

The 2014 Act introduced the biggest reforms to SEND in a generation, aimed at making the system less confrontational, promoting better involvement of parents and increasing focus on outcomes and transition to adult life.

An important part of these reforms was the move from statements of SEN to more holistic education, health and care (EHC) plans. EHC plans will ensure that a young person's needs are assessed in a coherent way across education, health and social care services. They can remain in place from birth to the age of 25 and have a clear focus on outcomes, including the support a young person will need to achieve them. EHC plans must be produced by the local area in partnership with parents, children and young people and based on a co-ordinated approach to the delivery of services across education, health and care, supported by a duty to plan and commission services jointly.

In the most recent period, 98.9% of children and young people in Wirral assessed were issued with an EHC plan for the first time, compared with an average% % 26/26/11dren landeyoung people (0-25) with statements assessed and EHC plan issued (2023)





Meeting statutory timelines

It is in the interests of all those concerned that EHC needs assessments are carried out in a timely manner. Regulations set out that the overall time it takes from the local authority receiving a request for an assessment and the final EHC plan being issued (if one is required) should be no longer than 20 weeks. In Wirral, 32.5% were issued within 20 weeks, excluding exceptional cases where LAs are allowed to exceed the 20 week time limit, compared to the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 57.3%. Including exceptions, 32.5% were issued within 20 weeks, compared to the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 55.4%.

% of new EHC plans issued within 20 weeks, excluding exceptions (2023)



Proportion of new EHC Plans issued within 20 weeks, including exceptions (%) (2023)





Discontinued statements

It is expected that all those who have a statement and who would have continued to have one under the current system, will be transferred to an EHC plan – no-one should lose their statement and not have it replaced with an EHC plan simply because the system is changing. The following chart shows the number of children with statements who the local authority has assessed as not requiring an EHC plan. In Wirral, this decision was made for 12 statements, compared to the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 26.

Assessments that did not result in an EHC plan

The following chart shows the proportion of children and young people who underwent an EHC needs assessment but the local authority assessed as not requiring an EHC plan. In Wirral, 1.1% of children and young people assessed were not issued with an EHC plan, compared to the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 4.8%.

% of children and young people (0-25) with statements assessed and no EHC plan issued (assessments) (2023)





Personal budgets

The reforms enabled greater personalisation of support through the use of a personal budget to provide children and young people with real choice and control over the design of their care and education package. The personal SEN budget is a sum of money made available by the local authority, at the request of a parent or young person, if it is clear that without this additional (top-up) funding, it will not be possible to meet the child's learning needs. In Wirral, 4 people have taken up personal budgets, compared to the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 102. Please note that where values have been suppressed, this means that the number of pupils is too low to be published.




Attainment of pupils with SEN

The Early Years Foundation Stage Profile (EYFSP) is a teacher assessment of children's development at the end of the end of the academic year in which the child turns five. The profile introduced in 2012/13 and revised significantly in 2021/22 to assess children in 7 areas of learning, covering 17 early learning goals (ELGs). A child is now rated as either at the 'emerging' or the 'expected' level. Therefore the maximum possible attainment score is 17 points.

The chart below shows the average EYFSP score achieved by pupils with statements/plans, pupils on SEN support and pupils without SEN. The first set of bars show that pupils with statements/plans in Wirral achieve an average score of 1.3, compared to 1.8 in All English metropolitan boroughs. The second set of bars show that pupils on SEN support in Wirral achieve an average score of 7.8, compared to 8.0 in All English metropolitan boroughs. The final set of bars show that pupils without SEN in Wirral achieve an average score of 14.8, compared to 14.8 in All English metropolitan boroughs.



Phonics

The phonics approach teaches children to decode words by sound, rather than recognising whole words. The phonics screening check is designed to confirm whether pupils have learnt phonic decoding to an appropriate standard. In Wirral, 49% of pupils with SEN Support are meeting the expected standard of phonic decoding, compared to a All English metropolitan boroughs average of 48%. 17% of pupils with statements in Wirral meet the standard, compared to 17% in All English metropolitan boroughs. Finally, 87% of pupils without SEN in Wirral meet the standard, compared to 86% in All English metropolitan boroughs.



Key Stage 2

All children in state funded primary schools are required to take part in key stage 2 national curriculum assessments before they move to secondary school. The tests are designed to show what pupils have achieved in selected parts of a subject at the end of each key stage.

5% of pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans and 25% of pupils on SEN support in Wirral achieve a at least the expected level in reading, writing and mathematics at KS2. For pupils with statements, this is an improvement on the previous period (2%) and for pupils with SEN support this is an improvement on the previous period (21%). This compares an All English metropolitan boroughs average of 7% for pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans, and 24% for pupils on SEN support. The third chart in this series shows attainment for children with no SEN, which stands at 69% in Wirral and 70% in All English metropolitan boroughs.

% reaching at least the expected level in RWM at KS2 (2022/23 (academic))




% of pupils with SEN with a statement attaining at least the expected level at KS2 in reading & writing and maths (from 2019/20 (academic) to 2022/23 (academic))





Key Stage 4 (GCSE)

4.2% of pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans and 23.8% of pupils on SEN support in Wirral achieve grades 9-5 in English and maths at KS4. This compares to the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 6.0% for pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans, and 18.0% for pupils on SEN support. For comparison, of pupils with no SEN, 50.2% in Wirral and 46.5% in All English metropolitan boroughs achieve grades 9-5 in English and maths at KS4.









The attainment 8 score for pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans was 13.6 score and 34.8 score of pupils on SEN support in Wirral. This compares to the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 13.2% for pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans, and 31.8% for pupils on SEN support. For comparison, the attainment 8 score of pupils with no SEN was 49.4 score in Wirral and 47.9% in All English metropolitan boroughs.

Please note that where values are not displayed, this is a result of them being suppressed, which means that the number of pupils is too low to be published.



The progress 8 score for pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans was -1.03 score and -0.44 score of pupils on SEN support in Wirral. This compares to the All English metropolitan boroughs average of -1.18% for pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans, and -0.55% for pupils on SEN support. For comparison, the attainment 8 score of pupils with no SEN was 0.00 score in Wirral and -0.05% in All English metropolitan boroughs.



The English Baccalaureate (EBacc) is a school performance measure. It allows people to see how many pupils get a grade 5 or above in the core academic subjects at key stage 4 in any government-funded school. 0.5% of pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans and 8.0% of pupils on SEN support in Wirral achieve the Ebacc at KS4. This compares to the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 1.1% for pupils with statements of SEN or EHC plans, and 4.0% for pupils on SEN support.




Preparation for adulthood


The reforms placed increased emphasis on supporting children and young people with SEND to make a positive transition to adulthood, including paths to employment, good adult health, independent living and participating in society. For more information visit http://www.preparingforadulthood.org.uk/.

This first chart below shows the percentage of the Key Stage 4 SEN cohort in a sustained education, employment or training destination at 17. To be included in the measure, young people have to show sustained participation in education, training or employment destinations in all of the first two terms of the year after they completed key stage 4. In Wirral, 83.3% of the KS4 cohort with a statement were in education, employment or training at 17, this compares to the previous period of 88.9% and the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 87.8%. Of those without a statement 90.6% were in education, employment or training at 17, 87.2% were in education, employment or training at 17 in All English metropolitan boroughs.

% of KS4 cohort with statement of SEN in Education & Employment or Training at 17 (from 2017/18 (academic) to 2021/22 (academic))



% of KS4 cohort with SEN Support in Education & Employment or Training at 17 (from 2017/18 (academic) to 2021/22 (academic))






Key Stage 5

Key Stage 5 is the period of education covering pupils aged 16-18. The next chart shows the percentage of the KS5 SEND cohort in a sustained education, employment or training destination in the first two terms of the year after they completed A level or other level 3 qualifications. This is 81.1% in Wirral, which compares to 81.7% in the previous period, and the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 79.3%.


NEET

The Department for Education reports 16 and 17 year olds recorded as not in education, employment, or training (NEET) known to the local authority. This may include where their activity is not known. Young adult offenders in custody are excluded. The annual figure is made from an average of December, January and February.


The percentage of 16 and 17 year olds with SEND recorded as NEET is 11.2% in Wirral, which compares to 12.3% in the previous period, and the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 11.1. Those with SEN support recorded as NEET is 8.7% in Wirral, which compares to 6.5% in the previous period, and the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 9.9%. For those without SEND recorded as NEET the percentage is 3.5% in Wirral which compares to 3.5% in the previous period, and the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 4.7%.







Level 2


Attainment of Level 2 equates to achievement of 5 or more GCSEs at grades A*-C or a Level 2 vocational qualification of equivalent size. The next chart shows that the percentage of the SEN cohort studying in Wirral at the age of 16 (academic age 15) who attain a Level 2 qualification, including English and Maths, by the age of 19, is 45.9%, compared to an average of 43.0% across All English metropolitan boroughs for those with SEN support. This compares to those with statement of which 12.4% attained a Level 2 qualification, including English and Maths in Wirral and 14.5% in All English metropolitan boroughs.

Percentage of 19 year olds qualified to level 2 including English and Maths (2022/23 (academic))






% of 19 year olds with SEN Support qualified to level 2 including English and Maths (from 2018/19 (academic) to 2022/23 (academic))




Level 3

Attainment of Level 3 equates to achievement of 2 or more A-levels or equivalent qualifications. The following chart shows the percentage of the SEN cohort studying in Wirral at the age of 16 (academic age 15) who attain a level 3 by the age of 19 is 30.4% for those with SEN support and 7.5% for those with a statement or EHC Plan.

% of 19 year olds with statement of SEN or EHC plan qualified to level 3 (from 2018/19 (academic) to 2022/23 (academic))





Accommodation status for adults with learning disabilities

In Wirral, 87.8% of adults (defined as 18-65 year olds) with learning disabilities who were receiving support from social services lived in their own home or with families, compared to 86.9% in the previous period and the All English metropolitan boroughs average of 85.6%.

% of adults with learning disabilities who live in their own home or with their family (2022/23)



Experience of the system

A central aim of the reforms was to ensure that the experience of gaining support was positive for children, young people and their families.


If a child's parent or the young person is dissatisfied with their EHC needs assessment or plan, they can appeal to the First-tier (SEN and Disability) Tribunal. The tribunal hears appeals against decisions made by the local authorities.

Mediation is when an impartial person, who is trained to deal with two opposing sides, acts as a referee in a dispute. Effective mediation provides a cost effective alternative in resolving disputes between parents, young people, health services and/or local authorities concerning the provision made for children with SEND.

The number of mediation cases held in Wirral was 15, and the proportion that went on to appeal was 24.6%. The SEND tribunal appeal rate was 2.5% in Wirral, this compares to the average for All English metropolitan boroughs of 1.9%.


Number of SEND mediation cases that have been held (2023)

% of Special Educational Needs and Disability mediation cases that went on to appeal (2021)







Absence

Persistent absentees are defined as pupils who have missed 10% or more of school sessions through authorised or unauthorised absence. In Wirral 34.7% of pupils with statements or plans were persistent absentees.

SEN pupils with a statement defined as persistent absentees as a % of the school population (from 2018/19 (academic) to 2022/23 (academic))





Exclusion

Fixed period exclusion refers to a pupil who is excluded from a school for a set period of time. A fixed period exclusion can involve a part of the school day and it does not have to be for a continuous period. A pupil may be excluded for one or more fixed periods up to a maximum of 45 school days in a single academic year.

In Wirral, the rate of fixed term exclusions for SEN pupils - calculated by taking the number of fixed term exclusions for SEN pupils and dividing it by the total number of SEN pupils in the LA - was 20.51%. The compares to an average of 21.42% in All English metropolitan boroughs.




A permanent exclusion refers to a pupil who is excluded and has their name removed from the school register. Such a pupil would then be educated at another school or via some other form of provision.

In Wirral the permanent exclusion rates for SEN pupils with a statement was 0.24%, compared to the previous period when it was a rate of 0.20%. In All English metropolitan boroughs the rate is 0.21%, which has increased since the previous period (0.13%).




